From the Pastor's Study

Grace and peace to you from our Lord, Jesus Christ,

We are now into the season after Pentecost. We have gone from white to red to green. Our lives are expanding further into the world as the warmth of the sun returns and the pandemic subsides (we hope and pray). What I have learned in life is that we are always living in transitions. Right now, we are transition from spring to summer, from Easter to the time after Pentecost, from social distance to gatherings and hugging again.

Some of the transition come expectedly and almost without our giving much thoughts while some give us fits and frustrations. For the congregation, we are in the midst of such a transition. None of us expected a pastoral transition when the pandemic hit but now, you have bald guy leading worship each Sunday morning.

Compounding the uncomfortableness of the pastoral transition, we now have another transition upon us with our child care center. Lets be honest, none of us saw these coming days before it happened, but it did happen and we are left with questions, concerns, and ponderings about the future of the congregation, child care, and ministry in general.

As a seasoned interim pastor, I have realized that some of the greatest challenges that come to a congregation tend to come during a pastoral transition. It is a time of grieving but also a time of renewal and starting over.

Staff that the last pastor has hired often take the opportunity to start new also. The leadership of the congregation tends to become more aware of what the Lord is calling the congregation to become and will find ways to live out that new calling. That often means new staff and leadership.

I acknowledge that these transitions are not easy, but it does provide for a fresh start for the congregation and the new pastor. This allows for visioning, new ideas, and new beginnings for the congregation, the members, and the community.

Leading a congregation through a transition is often stressful and full of challenges, but with key staff people leaving, the challenge becomes much greater and the stress is heightened. Yet, I have been in awe of the congregation and primarily of the congregation's leadership.





Fresh Starts

Your leaders have stepped up and owned the changes around the transition and have made this place alive again.

It was the leadership that helped us bring back in-person worship.

- It was the leadership that sought to provide every means possible for the ministry of the congregation to continue
- It was the leadership of the congregation that worked with the synod to bring in an interim when there weren't many around.
- It was the leadership that worked closely with me to handle the events of Joelle's departure.
- It was the leadership that made all the difference in guaranteeing the amazing success of the child care chicken BBQ.
- It is the leadership that are working overtime to find a new director, accountant, and with other leaders, to find a new pastor.

I could keep focusing on the leadership, but the leadership is more than just those on Council and committee. The leadership is really a reflection of the entire congregation and the sense of calling that this congregation has.

I am grateful to be working with such faithful disciples of Christ, and I am thankful to be a part of a faith community like St. Timothy's (albeit only for a short time) where spirit of the Christ is active and working.

God bless you all and may He continue to bless the congregation.

Worship Notes

Have you ever wondered how the liturgical worship service was originally organized? It started not long after Jesus ascended into heaven. The remaining disciples took many elements of the Jewish worship and incorporated into them the Christian teachings. However, as the church grew within the first couple hundred years of Christ's ascension, there was no uniform liturgy and format for Christian worship. Each location (church) had their own way to worship the Lord.

Finally, Justin Martyr shared with a friend in a letter dated back to the second century about worship in Asia Minor (today's Turkey). We learned from his letter that worship contained two major parts. The first part was called Service of the Word. During the Service of the Word, readings of Scriptures and commentaries were shared by the priest along with prayers and hymn singing. At that time, the vast majority of the people did not own a printed copy of the Bible so this was the only time people got to read and hear the Scriptures and get instructions in it. Therefore, the Service of the Word was often lengthy, lasting for hours.

During this particular part of the worship, everyone was invited to participate and it was extremely crucial for those who were learning about the faith to prepare them for baptism (the fore-runner of today's Confirmation process). When the Service of the Word was finished, those who were not baptized were dismissed in preparation for the second half of the worship experience.

The second part of Sunday worship was called Service of Holy Communion. It was started with a kiss of peace, not a handshake. After the kiss, the wine and bread was brought forth to the presiding pastor by someone in the congregation who had provided it from their vineyard or kitchen.

After a series of prayers, a Eucharistic prayer was prayed over the communion elements (wine and bread). The Eucharistic (communion) prayer usually invoked the saving acts of God and the power of the Holy Spirit. A special blessing was given. After the blessing, the bread was broken and shared and a common cup of wine was passed and the worship service would conclude with a benedictory prayer.

This act of communion must have been very powerful because it was done in homes where people through the course of their church life together knew one another intimately. These people must have shared the same trials and tribulations along with joys and wonderful moments together. In all of this, to share it with Christ at the center of one's gathering in one's intimate setting must have been very powerful and sacred.

May you find the same sacred experience in Christ through the act of worship and communion with one another and with God.



OREMUS!

Simply put, oremus (oh - ray-moose) is Latin for "Let us pray." It is one of the most ancient term of worship in the Christian church. It dates back to the founding of the church with the disciples James, John and Peter.

This term is used regularly to begin prayers in the Coptic (Egyptian), Easter Orthodox, the Roman Catholic, and liturgical Protestant Churches. In all these churches, it originally was pronounced in Latin, and not long after the Reformation, the vernacular of the people worshiping in each congregation began to adopt their linguistic version.

For mystics and early church nomads, it was a source of comfort as everyone in the European continent, regardless of nationality, understood what the term meant and reacted accordingly. For mystics, it became a term for a life of prayers and a metaphor for the constant readiness to commune with God.

Today, this term is used only in the Latin mass in Roman Catholic and Orthodox churches. For the most part it has been relegated to the scholars who study topics that are associated with Latin and the Church.

It is still a good term for all of us to know for it reminds us in three simple syllables of a posture that all Christians should have: one of constant readiness to converse with our Lord.

May you live in constant readiness to converse with our Lord and to serve Him always.



Call Committee update

The Call Committee held two more meetings on May 5th and 25th, and our next meeting is scheduled for June 13th. We have received results from the survey asking for your feedback regarding the characteristics of our ministry, the five most critical tasks you believe our next pastor should focus on, and the ministry gifts that our next pastor should possess.

On May 18th and May 23rd, the Committee hosted discussions regarding those survey results and: (1) ways in which Grand Island has been challenged by change and transition in the last five years, (2) trends within St. Timothy's in the last five years, and (3) identifying St. Timothy's gifts and how they are being used. Thank you to those who attended the discussions. We have tabulated the results of the surveys and the feedback from those small group discussions and we will incorporate them into the Ministry Site Profile ("MSP").

We are now in the drafting phase of the MSP. Our expectation remains that by the end of June, we should be in a position to present a draft of the MSP to the Church Board for consideration. Again, that would mean that we should be in a position to post the MSP in July.

If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact any member of the Call Committee. And please continue to pray for Christ's grace as we proceed through the discernment process.

Altar Guild Notes: June, 2021

The green Sundays have begun! The liturgical season is Time after Pentecost. The green paraments are used to signify the life of the church with the Holy Spirit and recall the tree of life that is Christ among us.

It is the longest season as it lasts until Advent. There are no recurring festivals, although this year we will celebrate Mary, Mother of Our Lord as it falls on a Sunday in August. These Sundays are counted. We use the system of counting each one after Pentecost Sunday, helping us to keep the discipline of weekly assembly. (FYI, there are 25 Sundays this year in Time after Pentecost!)

You will also see our green banner on the wall. Pastor may wear green vestments. We will use green plants and accents to emphasize the season. And, I say it every year, nature is an amazing accent for us! God has created so many shades of green!! I don't know yet if outdoor services will be held this year. But all of outside is available for individual devotions or prayer time.

You may notice that the Paschal candle remains extinguished during this season. It will only be lit for baptisms and funerals.

Missions Spotlight

Peace Not Walls is the name of the branch of the ELCA Advocacy ministry that works for justice and peace in Palestine and Israel. In the news lately, you have undoubtedly seen the renewal of hostilities between the two. Regardless where your sympathies lie, the ELCA accompanies both to promote respect for human rights, reconciliation, and peace. ELCA's primary companion in this work is the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land, and the two church bodies are members of the Lutheran World Federation.

In recent weeks, the Israeli government has made plans to remove Palestinians from their own homes in East Jerusalem so Israelis can live there. Even though Israel has made very positive progress on COVID vaccinations, very few Palestinians have had the opportunity to get it, and COVID deaths in Gaza and the West Bank have been disproportionately high. During the Muslim holy month of Ramadan, Israeli security forces impeded access to the Al-Aqsa Mosque, and even attacked worshippers. Rockets have destroyed entire neighborhoods in Gaza, while Israel's sophisticated defense system prevents most of the damage from Palestinian weapons.

These events are in addition to the decades-long military incursions, restrictions on movement, limited assess to worship, health care, education, farmland, and clean water. Of course, there has been damage and death on the Israel side too, but significantly less.

ELCA Advocacy brings these situations to light so that we can express our concern to our elected officials, so that we can pray for solutions, so that we can knowledgeably discuss the issues. Peace Not Walls exists because of your mission support. *Thank you!*

We are church together for the sake of the world. God's Work. Our Hands.
